Section 319(h): Georgia's Nonpoint Source Implementation Grant APPLICATION DEADLINE: NOVEMBER 30, 2010

Under Section 319(h) of the Clean Water Act, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) awards a *Nonpoint Source Implementation Grant* to the Georgia Environmental Protection Division (GAEPD) to fund projects in support of *Georgia's Nonpoint Source Management Program*. The State is scheduled to receive approximately \$4.4 million. This funding is distributed via a competitive process to select the most effective projects working towards the prevention, control. and/or abatement of nonpoint source

MATCH REQUIREMENTS: Projects are required to show a strong commitment at the local level by providing no less than 40% of the total project cost. This can be accomplished through local funds or in-kind services.

ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS: Public agencies, such as cities, counties, local authorities (e.g. sewer, water), regional development centers, school systems, state colleges and universities, and state agencies are eligible. <u>State law prohibits non-governmental</u>

organizations from receiving Section 319(h) funds directly, but these organizations are encouraged to form partnerships with public agencies to develop or implement projects.

ELIGIBLE PROJECTS: Eligible projects include regulatory or non-regulatory enforcement, technical assistance, education and outreach, technology transfer, TMDL implementation, watershed restoration, BMP demonstration, monitoring and assessment, ground water activities, and non-permit required urban stormwater control activities.

PRIORITY PROJECTS: Priority is given to projects developing, revising,

and/or implementing a TMDL Implementation Plan or Watershed Plan in order to alleviate the criterion violated as identified in Georgia's Section 305(b)/303(d) list of impaired waters. Implementation Plans that meet USEPA's Nine Key Elements for Watershed Planning and that were developed using 319(h) funds will receive a higher priority. Highest priority projects will result in water quality being fully restored. Priority is also given to projects supporting a watershed-wide management approach involving multiple partners.

Successful projects lead to a direct reduction in pollutant loads and measurable improvements to water quality or aquatic habitat. Applicants must specifically follow the Section 319(h) Grant Guidelines. A proposal may be 1-3 years in duration with 1-2 years preferred.

Section 319(h) Grant Timeline

- July: GAEPD advertises the call for proposals
- July-October: GAEPD staff meets with applicants to discuss proposals
- November 30, 2010 deadline to receive proposals
- December-February: GAEPD staff reviews project proposals
- May 2011: applicants are notified of whether their project has been recommended for funding
- April-July: GAEPD and grant recipient finalize project workplans
- August-October: a contract is executed between GAEPD and the grant recipient
- October: project activities begin
