



## **Governance and Administration**





As part of the **Chinatown Green Street Demonstration Project**, EVP Somerville and Secretary Millay held a conference call on Monday with Design Workshop and the developer of the 600 Massachusetts Avenue project, currently under construction, to continue the investigation of opportunities for integrating green street principles into the project.

## **Government Affairs**

The **FHA** is proposing a major policy change: Instead of requiring roads that receive federal funding to be designed like highways, the agency would change its standards to allow greater flexibility. The purpose of the revisions is to ease some of the federally-mandated design standards to make it easier for communities of all sizes to design and build streets that are safer for everyone. **ASLA urges its members to review the** Federal Register notice and be prepared to submit comments about the proposal.

Congress is still negotiating LWCF. The <u>Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF)</u> expired on September 30, 2015, and Congress is still trying to work on a deal to reauthorize the program. As one of the most important federal programs in helping landscape architects design parks and outdoor recreation spaces, it is critical that ASLA members continue to contact their legislators about reauthorizing LWCF. ## **Resource Development**

On November 30, Manager Shawn Balon, ASLA attended the NEA Creative Placemaking & Parks Steering Committee Kick-Off Meeting. As part of the steering committee, ASLA will participate with the project partners, The Trust for Public Land and The City Parks Alliance, to inform the creation of the Creative Placemaking Awareness and Experience survey, build knowledge about creative placemaking in parks through a colloquium, and provide input and case studies for a field guide.



On December 1-2, Shawn Kelly, FASLA, and Manager Balon attended the Renewable Natural Resources Foundation (RNRF) Congress on Sustaining Western Water. The congress assessed the challenges of managing scarce water resources within the economic and regulatory framework of the western states and featured discussions of methods and opportunities to sustain water resources through water transfers, land-use policy tools, and future scenario planning. Recommendations from the meeting will be shared with public policy makers and other stakeholders.
