Mike served the Florida Chapter well as Section Chair many times, Fellows Chair and LARE Review instructor for more than 20 years. He was an advocate of young landscape architects, a mentor and a supporter. Mike also gave generously of his time, effort, and used his insider knowledge to guide the establishment of the Historic American Landscapes Survey in Florida as an ASLA Florida Chapter program. He was elected Fellow in 2005 based upon his long term service to ASLA and the profession as noted above.

Mike will certainly be missed as he has touched many lives. He was a special friend to the Chapter and UF, and he loved helping the younger landscape architects and students. This was evident in the LARE Prep sessions as one could see how much he cared. His wealth of knowledge is going to be hard to replace as he could be counted on to help in all sections of the LARE. He had a tough but kind way about helping the attendees of the LARE Prep course. No one could get away with a free pass. They had to earn it. Mike will be there in spirit as the LARE Prep continues.
