Keynote Speakers



Barry Schoch
Pennsylvania Department of Transportation

Barry Schoch, P.E., was nominated by Governor Tom Corbett to be Pennsylvania Secretary of Transportation in January 2011. He has over 30 years of experience in the engineering field and has been heavily involved in either consulting, managing or playing a key role in many of the pending or completed transportation projects in Pennsylvania over that time.

For the 15 years prior to becoming Secretary of Transportation, Schoch worked for McCormick, Taylor & Associates as vice president and manager of their Harrisburg office transportation department. His portfolio ran the gamut from concept planning to finance strategies to project designs. A few of his projects include the Mon-Fayette Expressway in Southwest Pennsylvania; the proposed interchange between the Pennsylvania Turnpike and Interstate 95; the South Central Centre County Transportation Study in Centre County; the I-83 master plan for the Harrisburg region; the widening and reconstruction of U.S. 30 in Lancaster County; and the rebuilding of the interchange of U.S. 15 and Route 581 in Cumberland County. He played key roles in improving PennDOT's approach to context sensitive design and training for environmental quality efforts. He also managed engineering for studies of Mag-Lev in the Washington-Baltimore corridor and was the project director for Pennsylvania's proposed Mag-Lev project from Pittsburgh to Greensburg.

Schoch previously served as the president of the Pennsylvania Highway Information Association and as the chair of Pennsylvania Consulting Engineers transportation committee, and the Design Professionals Coalition Transportation Committee.

He graduated from Penn State University in 1982 with a degree in civil engineering and is a licensed professional engineer.

Carlton Ward Jr
Carlton Ward Photography

Carlton Ward is a conservation photographer from Tampa, Florida. His passion for nature was born from the Florida landscape, where eight generations of family history have grounded his perspective. He sees natural environments and cultural legacies as the earth's greatest yet most threatened resources.

Carlton is a founding fellow of the International League of Conservation Photographers (iLCP) and created the Legacy Institute for Nature & Culture (LINC), a non-profit organization with the purpose of celebrating and protecting Florida's natural and cultural heritage through art. While completing a Master's degree in Ecology, Carlton wrote *Conservation Photography*, the first thesis on the emerging field.

Carlton's current focus is the Florida Wildlife Corridor – a collaborative vision to connect remaining natural lands, waters, working farms, forests and ranches from the Everglades to Georgia, protecting a functional ecological corridor for the health of people, wildlife and watersheds. “My Florida Wildlife Corridor work was inspired by Florida cowboys and black bears and the shared land they both need to survive,” says Carlton. “So many stories like these are missing from Florida's modern identity. I want people to discover a renewed sense of place for our state.”

In 2012, he co-led the Florida Wildlife Corridor Expedition – a 100 day, 1,000 mile trek that explored the last remaining natural path through the length of the Florida peninsula. The trek began in Everglades National Park in January and reached Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge in southern Georgia on Earth Day, April 22. In 2013, Carlton released his most recent book, *Florida Wildlife Corridor Expedition*, which combines his stunning photographs with essays and quotes from fellow explorers to bring the story to life in vivid detail. The Florida Wildlife Corridor Expedition story was also released as a national PBS film.

Carlton received the North American Nature Photography Association's 2013 Mission Award, which recognizes outstanding accomplishments by one of its members. He continues his mission to photograph within the Florida Wildlife Corridor, concentrating on private ranches in the Northern Everglades that are candidates for protection through the new Everglades Headwaters National Wildlife Refuge and Conservation Area. The expedition team is also planning a future trek to highlight the importance of a wildlife corridor between the Everglades Headwaters and the Florida panhandle.

Training and Symposiums

Best Practice Principles for Environmental Assessments (additional fee required)

This course will introduce students to the concept of Best Practice Principles for Environmental Assessments (BPPs for EAs), describe the methodology used to create the BPPs for EAs, and describe the seven BPPs for EAs that were created during the CEQ NEPA Pilot Project. The Agenda includes workshops analyzing and drafting Purpose and Need statements and exploring Public Involvement challenges. Other sessions include discussions of the Proposed Action and Alternatives, EA Topics and Contents, Determination of Significance and Applicability of 40 C.F.R. § 1502.22, Cumulative Effects Assessment and Management, and Regulatory Consultation and Coordination. In addition, a structured panel with representatives from the Council on Environmental Quality (Horst Greczmiel, Associate Director for NEPA Oversight), senior Federal agency officials, and senior NEPA practitioners will address the topic of "Improving EAs." Each student will receive a copy of the BPPs for EAs, the training materials, and a training certificate.

Digital Visualization Simulation (additional fee required)

This day-long symposium targets visual resource specialists, public land managers, NEPA practitioners, and developers and their project planners/designers with a basic understanding of visualization technology used for project planning, design and visual impact assessment (VIA). The purpose of the training is to improve and expand upon our understanding to maximize the value and utility of visualizations for project planning and design purposes, as well as of what is required to produce defensible and accurate visualizations to support NEPA-related or state-specific documentation of anticipated impacts, regardless of jurisdiction. The symposium will have three parts. The first part will introduce design data review, scoping for the project and site reconnaissance/photography and the emergence of visualization tools with examples of good and bad simulations. The second part will address more technical aspects of computer modeling, adding materials and texture; view-matching and lighting/rendering; digital painting and compositing; animation and post production; and exhibit distribution and printing. The final part will be a panel discussion involving all instructors and audience in bringing visualization into the assessment process plus due diligence and participation issues. Speakers will include nationally- and internationally-renown leaders in the field of visualization technology especially for VIAs prepared for large scale projects targeted for both private and federal public lands.

The Interrelation Between Listed Species and Invasive Species (additional fee required)

This course will describe the most up to date research and findings concerning listed and endangered species and how they have been affected by the introduction of invasive species. The panel will present its findings and will provide recommendations for an integrated approach to protection of listed and endangered species and eradication of invasive species.

Career Development (no additional fee)

This training will include four separate sessions to help develop the careers of young professionals as well as seasoned veterans. The Academy of Board Certified Environmental Professionals will provide training on **How to Become a Certified Environmental Professional**. The training includes presentations about what being a CEP means, what the qualifications are, and benefits of this type of certification. The CEP program provides eligible environmental professionals who possess special qualifications of education, experience, and accomplishment with the opportunity to be evaluated by a

board of peers, and if they qualify, to be recognized for their accomplishments. Lunch will include a presentation on **New Options for Professional Development: Demonstrating Online Learning Methods** given by representatives from American Public University. DePaul University will be providing training on **Publishing a Peer Reviewed Article**. The afternoon will finish with an **Environmental Careers Seminar**.

Track Descriptions

Brownfields

Track Chair: Teri Hasbrouck, *Environmental Consulting & Technology Inc.*

The responsible redevelopment and productive reuse of Brownfield sites can mean new sustainable development opportunities, improved community and environmental stewardship, and the elimination of potential impacts to human health. The public sector can benefit from an increased number of employment opportunities, increased local and state tax revenues, improvements in the community's quality of life, and a reduction in urban sprawl. The Brownfield track will cover these topics and more as they relate to the redevelopment of Brownfield sites in our communities.

Coastal

Track Chair: Don Deis, *Atkins*

The purpose of the Coastal Track is to explain the multiple uses and priorities that impact our oceans and coasts. America is intricately connected to and directly reliant on the oceans and coasts. With more than 95,000 miles of coastline and the largest exclusive economic zone in the world, America benefits from a wealth of goods and services derived from ocean and coastal ecosystems. America's stewardship of the oceans and coasts is intimately linked to environmental sustainability, human health and well-being, national prosperity, adaptation to climate change, and national security. Our welfare depends on healthy marine ecosystems, and these same systems are vulnerable to various competing human actions such as aquaculture, fishing, energy production, military uses, shipping, and tourism.

Cultural Resources

Track Chair: Heather Lee Miller, PhD, *Historical Research Associates, Inc.*

Cultural Resources are often an afterthought in world of environmental compliance and yet by law they are equally as important. Indeed, neglecting to address them adequately can lead to anything from project delays, at best, to political black eyes at worst, and everything in between. The sessions in the Cultural Resources track are designed to assist environmental professionals understand and negotiate some potential pitfalls of cultural resources compliance.

Geology

Track Chair: Jonathon Welker, *SurvTech Solutions Inc.*

The goal of the Geology/Subsurface track is to provide examples of alternative and useful tools the environmental professional can implement into their assessment. Various techniques may include geophysical or geochemical methodologies. Additionally, this track will educate environmental professionals on the importance of understanding the geologic structures in which they are working.

Land Management

Track Chair: Helene Merkel, *Marstel Day*

This session will look at the mitigation, monitoring, and adaptive management of solar energy production on public lands in two presentations from representatives of Argonne National Laboratories. Environmental stewardship and property rights will be assessed in respect to changing economic conditions as a result of the recent increases in energy production.

NEPA

Track Chair: Michael Smith, AECOM

The purpose of the NEPA track is to provide practitioners with a comprehensive overview and refresher of the most important recent NEPA policy and legal updates, as well as tips, techniques, and case studies for improving NEPA analyses in a number of key practice areas. This year's panel and individual paper sessions will address topics including: Annual NEPA Case Law and Policy Update; NEPA Compliance in Emergency Situations; NEPA Best Practices; Analysis of Noise Impacts; NEPA Analysis for Wind Energy Projects; and Impact Analysis for Night Sky Resources.

Remediation

Track Chair: Kelly Bishop, HSW Engineering

The Remediation Track is a forum to promote partnerships among public- and private-sector environmental professionals. Our goal is to exchange information on technologies, operations, management approaches, economics and public policies in the critical areas of environmental protection, assessment and remediation. Industry experts will be presenting on leading edge technologies that provide the latest update on new advances, developments and challenges while showcasing best practices, cost-effectiveness and sustainability. These sessions are an opportunity to develop new collaborations and gather experts on the different topics such as pollution detection; environmental remediation; pollution prevention; water, soil and air pollution and treatment; wastewater management and treatment; desalination; renewable and non-renewable energies; oil spills and cleanups; Florida's Oil & Gas Program; and impacts of industrialization on the environment.

Sustainability

Track Chair: Jessica Gattenby, Arcadis

Sustainability is used to capture efforts that are being made by agencies, industry, and consultants to connect the many pieces that come together to make the whole of meeting the needs of the present without comprising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs. The topics covered in the sustainability track include implementation of sustainability practices and tracking into public organizations, private industry and government research; using sustainability rating tools including the ENVISION rating system to assess the sustainability of projects; monitoring, assessing, and forecasting environmental states and processes in a world facing global change; implementation of environmental compliance tools to maintain worker and environmental protections; and a "Hot Topic" lunch on Replenishing an Urban Forest. Project examples will provide information on the tools available to help organizations in tracking sustainability and how they are utilized, provide insight on how solutions were developed for unique situations, evaluate how to implement more sustainable solutions, and how to incorporate sustainability into project planning and implementation. The session will also have opportunities for engagement with panels on the benefits of environmental compliance manuals and building relationships for local environmental protection efforts.

Transportation

Track Chairs: Stacy Woodson, P.E., *HR Green, Inc.* and Nancy Skinner, *Parsons Brinckerhoff*

The Transportation Track focuses on strategies for addressing environmental issues that are common for all modes of transportation. One group of panelists will discuss how the California High Speed Rail Authority is evaluating socioeconomic impacts, while another panel will demonstrate how the greater Seattle area is overcoming the “not in my back yard” challenge as they expand their light rail transit systems. Panelists will discuss how tolling of roadways present a unique challenge for NEPA practitioners in evaluating alternatives. Other topics in this track include the use and effectiveness of social media as a public outreach tool for transportation NEPA projects and how the transportation network plays an integrated and connected role to access to health care. Another session will discuss the implementation of environmental streamlining initiatives from the recent transportation act (MAP-21), the FHWA’s Every Day Counts (EDC), and the 2012 Executive Order 13604 - Improving Performance of Federal Permitting and Review of Infrastructure Projects.

Visual Resources

Track Chair: Richard Smardon, *SUNY*

The major themes for the visual track are the visual landscape impact in the coastal zone and renewable energy development siting issues on-shore and off-shore. Speakers will address the issue of impacts from docks and piers and the visual impacts of renewable energy development in Maine, Massachusetts and North Carolina. Information regarding the wind and solar visual impact analysis research that Argonne National Laboratory is doing for US Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management and the National Park Service will be presented.

Water Resources

Track Chair: John Moynier, *Dewberry*

One of the most pressing issues facing planners today is the effective management of our water resources, including ensuring that healthful, potable water supplies are available to everyone, and that our communities are protected from the devastating impacts of flooding. As the world’s population expands, it is becoming increasingly apparent that a large percentage of the world’s population does not have access to reliable water supplies that meet basic health standards.

The Water Resources track covers the broad range of integrated water resource planning issues, including: water supply, wastewater treatment and disposal, recycled water use, water conservation, groundwater management, sustainability, watershed protection, stormwater management, flood protection, and water quality. The focus is clearly on the field of integrated water resource management and planning- learning to maximize this precious resource while protecting environmental, economic and societal interests, all in the face of potential climatic changes and the required adaptation strategies that may be necessary to mitigate any resulting impacts.

Wetlands

Track Chair: David Dickson, *Cardno ENTRIX*

Wetlands are an integral part of the landscape. Identifying them and understanding how they work are crucial factors. They can enhance a project, provide recreational and wildlife viewing opportunities, support listed species, provide storage or attenuation, be part of the stormwater treatment train, serve as conservation areas, or mitigation to off-set unavoidable impacts. Wetlands can also present challenges to

projects. This track will provide examples, lessons learned, trends, and new cutting edge approaches through presentations by private and public sector professionals.

Wildlife

Track Chair: Kevin Shelton, AMEC

Wildlife poses a variety of management, regulatory and study issues due to their complexity and mobility in the environment. Understanding their interaction with flora, other fauna and the physical environment is a fascinating and an ongoing field of study. Recent developments in our understanding of wildlife have improved how we conduct our businesses and how governmental agencies regulate our activities within the environment. The wildlife track will delve into how we as professionals can improve upon our practices, develop public-private partnerships, and build infrastructure that meets the needs of wildlife.
