On March 18, 2016, we had the honor of representing the American Art Therapy Association at a meeting convened by the National Education Association (NEA) on the topic of Specialized Instructional Support Personnel (SISP). For context, the new education law "Every Student Succeeds Act" (ESSA) contains the term SISP to identify the non-educators who work in schools to support students through behavioral, emotional, and psychological



support. At their last annual assembly, the NEA board of directors introduced New Business Item D intended to design a professional continuum model by engaging stakeholders in detailing the contributions of SISPs, identifying their high quality training, addressing their environmental challenges and needs, and advocating for their continued inclusion in the schools. 

But it wasn't until a good friend brought up the term "art therapy" in conversation that Ellis' interest became piqued and she began the process of research and inquisition that would eventually lead her to her third career as an art therapist. She went on to graduate from the art therapy program at Steinhardt School of the Arts in New

Albertus Magnus art therapy program trains to provide creative healing









In New Haven, says Abbe Miller, director of the Graduate Art Therapy program at Albertus Magnus College, there is a lively art scene, one in which art is sometimes identified as a way to heal. Art therapy is a profession that uses artistic techniques, Miller said. In practice, an art therapist uses both art as therapy and therapy as art. Evie Lindemann, associate professor and clinical coordinator for the Albertus program, called it a "blended program." The graduate program at Albertus Magnus is the only accredited art therapy program in the state, and only one of 39 in the nation, Miller said. The program was established in 1997, conceptualized by professor Ragaa Mazen. READ MORE

A month-long exhibition on Marie Revaï, an artist and pioneer of art therapy for those with mental health disorders, winds up this week at the Centre d'Apprentissage Parallèle de Montréal. Revaï was born in 1911, three years before the outbreak of the First World War, to a Hungarian father and a French mother. Even as a child, she used drawing to share her experiences, Lamy said.
