With an acceptance rate of only 22%, The Journal of Affective Disorders is one of the most prestigious journals in the field of Clinical Neurology and Psychiatry. The article, co-authored with Rainbow T. H. Ho, Registered &

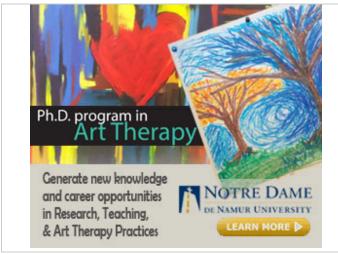


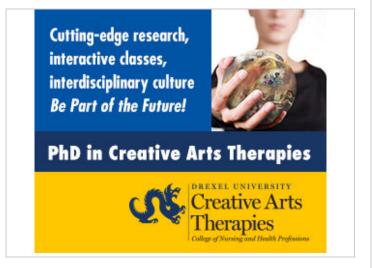

The letters urged: (1) support of the Medicare Mental Health Inpatient Equity Act of 2017, (2) funding for Title II-A of the Every Student Succeeds Act at its current level, and (3) that requested that grave concerns with provisions of the American Healthcare Act (AHCA) be taken into consideration in any Senate revisions to H.R. 1628. ## **Cutting Medicaid would hurt veterans**

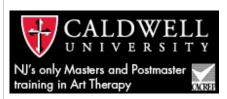
Efforts in Congress to cut Medicaid jeopardize a critical source of health coverage for veterans. Approximately 1.75 million veterans — nearly 1 in 10 — have Medicaid as a source of coverage. This coverage ensures that veterans get the primary and specialty health care they need when they need it. About 340,000 veterans nationally receive coverage through the Affordable Care Act's Medicaid expansion. Most of these veterans would likely lose that coverage if Congress passes the Republican proposal to slash funding for the Medicaid expansion. **READ MORE** 

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
