### Delaware Licensure Bill Passes Senate Unanimously, Now on to the House!





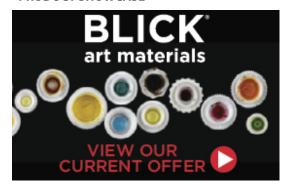




Senate Bill 43 was approved by the Delaware Senate on June 22, 2017, with a vote of 18 to 0! The bill now goes to the House Policy Analysis & Government Accountability Committee where it is scheduled for a hearing today (June 29). The bill authorizes a Professional Art Therapist License and an Associate Art Therapist License to be

administered by the State Board of Mental Health and Chemical Dependency Professionals. As described in the <u>DE General Assembly</u> summary, "The Art Therapy Practice Act will serve and protect the public by defining the scope of practice of art therapy; setting minimum standards of qualification, education, training, and experience for art therapists; and maintaining certain standards in the delivery of art therapy services." The bill also provides for the appointment of one or more credentialed art therapists to assist the Board in licensing art therapists. The AATA congratulates Jennifer August, MCAT, ATR-BC, Nicole Luther, MA, ATR-BC, and other Delaware art therapists for their dedicated work and leadership in this licensure effort. They worked tirelessly with the AATA national team to build the case for licensure and achieved strong legislative support in Delaware.

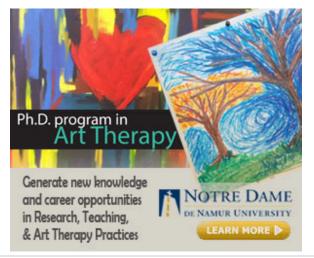

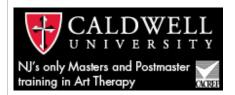

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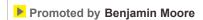


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
