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ASABE PUBLISHES SAFETY STANDARD FOR ANHYDROUS AMMONIA APPLICATION EQUIPMENT

ST JOSEPH, MICHIGAN— The American Society of Agricultural and Biological Engineers (ASABE) has completed the work on ANSI/ASABE S620 Safety for Anhydrous Ammonia Application Equipment. Anhydrous ammonia application equipment is becoming more complex, with integrated metering and distribution systems, automated control systems, automated hitching functions, and advanced product flow functions. This standard addresses nurse tank coupling and sectional delivery system design and is specific to the implements of husbandry used in the local transport and application of anhydrous ammonia for agricultural fertilizer. The standard will be applicable only to equipment manufactured following its publication.
