AATA Offers New Professional Scholarship Opportunity for 2016









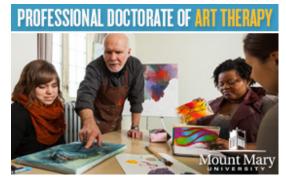

Vincent van Gogh and Salvador Dali, to name just two, were known much later to be suffering from mental illnesses but art became their channel to reach out to society. This therapeutic method was first used to expedite the recovery of trauma victims after World War II in hospitals in Britain, a method that was later adopted by the Americans because of its success. On American soil, this therapy was expanded by two art educators, Edith Kramer and Margareth Naumburg, to be integrated with medical treatment in the Veteran Affairs New York Harbor Healthcare System.
