The AATA Supports the Excellence in Mental Health Act










Last week the AATA endorsed the National Council for Behavioral Health's Mental Health Liaison Group (MHLG)'s letter in support of expanding the two-year Excellence in Mental Health Act demonstration program. This new legislation will increase access to community-based mental health services and substance-use treatment services in 24 states, while also improving Medicaid reimbursement for these services. In its fully implemented form, the Excellence in Mental Health Act will represent an over \$1 billion investment in mental health and addiction services. The AATA is among more than two-dozen national organizations that signed on to
