

Quilts and guilt making in the African-American culture can be traced back to the times when black Americans were enslaved. There are several accounts of how slaves incorporated the techniques of quilting from their native land's fabric making process, and enslaved Americans passed down quilting to other slaves. Materials gathered from scraps of fabric that could no longer be used, were repurposed to create quilts. Organized



techniques were not the goals for these people. The quilts were used to make covers to stay warm, and the makers took pride in the art process. The time spent putting the quilt pieces together allowed the makers opportunity to interact with each other, strategize plans, celebrate joys and empower through group cohesion. READ MORE


