What are your top three job responsibilities?

What is the biggest challenge you face on the job, and how are you managing it?

Moving people up too fast is also an internal failure that has widespread, devastating effects on an organization; you truly cannot not lead what you don't understand.

If you were to start a company from scratch, what values would you build it on?

If I started a company it would be valuing people and selecting people who create value. People will make or break any company - I clearly navigate toward solid individuals with the core competencies to create value and work well across teams. Having a baseline of respect, transparency, fair compensation and inclusion would be a solid starting point.

What are you proudest of?

After 30 years in this profession I still love all of its challenges, opportunities and rewards. Making the difference in so many past employees careers that to this day they still ask 'if there is an opening'.

If you could interview anyone, who would it be and why?

David Foster. Anyone who has 45 Grammy nominations and won 16 of them is doing something right from a leadership standpoint. It would be interesting to see how he extracts talent from such a diverse group of people and holds a high degree of success with nearly everything he touches.

What was your childhood dream job?

I wanted to become an Architect, the tuition was not within reach at the time.
