How to Become a Licensed Plumber in Texas



Your first step regardless of which path you choose is to get registered as an apprentice with the Texas State Board of Plumbing examiners: <u>https://tsbpe.texas.gov/license-types/apprentice/</u>

There are two different pathways to become a licensed plumber in Texas – through an apprenticeship (DOL program) or through working and taking courses on your own (non DOL)

If you were to take courses on your own, you would need to take:

- For tradesman license: 10 hour OSHA class, 8 hour residential code class, 6 hour continuing education class
- For journeyman license: 10 hour OSHA class, 8 hour residential code class, 18 hour commercial code, and two 6 hour continuing education classes

Note that the plumbing board has made certain exceptions during the pandemic, so check with them for any changes <u>https://tsbpe.texas.gov/texas-</u> plumbers-important-updates/

There are a number of other additional endorsements you can take on top of these licenses, but these are the first steps. You need to take one six hour continuing education class per year and renew your license with the plumbing board to maintain your license. If you have endorsements, those may also require additional continuing education.

Teachers

All teachers require a **4-year degree** and for many, a graduate degree is necessary as well.




Medical Doctors On average, physicians require a **4-year undergraduate degree**, **4-years in medical school**, and a **3-7 year residency** before beginning work




Plumbers receive ON THE JOB TRAINING Beginning work as a plumber requires **no prior education**, **degrees**, **or experience**, and only a high school diploma or GED when testing for more advanced Journeyman or Master licensing.

Starting Salaries

Plumbers make a very good living wage and can greatly increase their earnings by pursuing further licensing.
